CHAIRMAN'S REMARKS

The Chairman congratulated Councillor Hugh Evans, Leader of the Council, on being awarded an OBE in the Queen's New Year's honours list for services to local government. Councillor Hughes responded by saying that the honour was a result of the way members, the Chief Executive and other officers had worked together to improve services.

The Chairman also congratulated Denbighshire's Street Lighting Team on their recent successes with the national Association of Public Services Excellence Awards (APSE) scheme.

PETITION

Councillor Brian Blakeley presented a petition against the introduction of more traffic bollards on Trellewelyn Road, Rhyl which the Chairman accepted for the attention of the Joint Head of Highways and Infrastructure to respond to.

1 APOLOGIES

Apologies for absence were received from Councillors Carl Davies, Neville Hughes, Rhiannon Hughes, David Lee, Eryl Williams and Jane Yorke

2 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

No interests were declared.

3 URGENT MATTERS AS AGREED BY THE CHAIR

No urgent matters were raised.

4 CHAIRMAN'S DIARY

Members were advised that the Chairman's Diary had been circulated.

5 MINUTES

The minutes of the meeting held on the 15 November 2011 were submitted. Councillor Gwilym Evans reported that he was not present at the meeting as stated in the minutes, and that he had sent his apologies.

In respect of the Foryd Harbour Item discussed on the 15 November 2011 Councillor Rhys Hughes' suggestion for regular briefings to Council after Project Board meetings was <u>agreed</u>. Councillor Colin Hughes referred to the Charter with town and community councils, and requested that the Council consider the meeting diaries of town and community council when organising community events such as candidates' road-shows and area member meetings. The Corporate Director: Business Transformation and Efficiency agreed to contact relevant officers.

RESOLVED that, subject to the above, the minutes of the meetings held on the 15 November 2011 and the 24 November 2011 be confirmed as correct records and signed by the Chairman.

6 APPLICATIONS TO REGISTER LAND KNOWN AS 'THE PARK' OFF FFORDD ELAN, RHYL, AS A VILLAGE GREEN

The Principal Solicitor introduced as report in respect of two applications to register land known as The Park, off Ffordd Elan, Rhyl and outlined the history of the site and the applications and the Head of Legal and Democratic Services advised on the criteria in law that the Council must apply when making its decisions as the Commons Registration Authority. Council was advised that desirability and planning considerations did not apply.

Council was advised that a non-statutory independent inquiry commissioned by the Council to examine the merits of the applications had recommended refusal for all parts of the application site.

Councillors Ian Gunning and Brian Blakeley spoke on behalf of the applications on the grounds that the residents wanted to protect and improve the land for open, recreational use; an aim they said that the Council should support.

Members discussed:

- Whether the applications met the statutory requirements for registration of land as a Village Green
- The desirability of enhancing and protecting open space provision in the area

- The ownership of the application site; partly owned by the Council and partly by T Anwyl and Son Limited
- The circumstances where a decision by the Council could be challenged in the High Court through a judicial review
- Reviewing options available to the Council under its powers to secure open space provision
- The views of the residents

A call for a recorded vote was passed but subsequently withdrawn before the vote took place.

RESOLVED that:

- (i) The Council adopts the recommendations by the Inspector appointed by the Council to reject the two applications, received by the Council, to register land known as The Park, off Ffordd Elan, Rhyl, as a Village Green;
- (ii) Officers and local members be requested to meet with representatives of the applicants within 28 days to discuss protection of the land within the Council's ownership for open space provision; and
- (iii) Officers be requested to review the statutory powers available to the Council in respect of the application land not within the Council's ownership with a view to securing open space provision.

7 A COMPACT FOR CHANGE BETWEEN THE WELSH GOVERNMENT AND LOCAL AUTHORITIES

The Leader of the Council, Councillor Hugh Evans, opened the discussion on a Compact between local government and the Welsh Government setting out the terms of a new relationship through collaborative and partnership working to improve performance, efficiency and outcomes for service users. Councillor Evans thanked the political groups for allowing the Chief Executive and himself to discuss the Compact with them individually. He advised that Denbighshire was well placed to sign the Compact and saw collaboration as one of the approaches that could safeguard front-line services. In addition, the Compact would clarify the collaboration agenda for both local and national government over the next few years, but there was a risk that the Council could face financial penalties and political interventions if it did not deliver on the expectations within the Compact.

The Chief Executive reported on the three large collaborative projects that the Council was already participating in regarding education, social services and 'other services' (including waste treatment, highways, ICT and procurement). He advised that viable business cases for improvements and efficiencies would have to be proved before other proposed collaborations could proceed beyond the review stage.

Councillor Barbara Smith queried the milestones (delivery dates) in the compact, some of which had passed, and Councillor Green queried whether the Compact was a one-sided agreement where all the expectations fell on the local authority.

The Chief Executive stated that the Welsh Government had confirmed with him that participation rather than deadlines was the important factor, confirming that some of the deadlines had passed or were unrealistic. He had asked for this to be put in writing by the Welsh Government. He said that the Welsh Government's view was that they had provided a reasonable financial settlement for the next few years and in return expected the Compact agenda to be delivered.

Other issues raised by Members were:

- New ways of engaging with elected members beyond those provided by the regional collaboration boards were required
- All the north Wales local authorities would be considering whether to sign up to the Compact
- The differing numbers of councillors on the north Wales authorities meant that a fair mechanism was needed to ensure that Denbighshire's elected members were not less influential than their counterparts in other councils

The Leader agreed with Councillor Marfleet's statement that the WLGA should not sign agreements before consulting local authorities, and advised that he had raised this point with the WLGA.

RESOLVED that:

- (i) Members agree to sign up to the Compact;
- (ii) Members agree that Denbighshire will play an appropriate role in implementing the full range of collaborations set out in the Compact, provided:
 - (a) there are demonstrable service improvements for Denbighshire residents, or
 - (b) there are resource savings and the proposed new service model provides a service to Denbighshire residents that is at least as good as the service it proposes to replace.

8 COUNCIL FORWARD WORK PROGRAMME

The Head of Legal and Democratic Services reported that approval of the Council Tax levels was requested on the 28 February 2012 together with a report on the Treasury Management Strategy. A report in April 2012 on the Corporate Plan was no longer required.

Councillor Rhys Hughes referred to a report on the 28 February regarding joint supplementary planning guidance on the Pontcysyllte Aqueduct and Canal World Heritage Site. He remarked that the impression had been given that this item would go before the Planning Committee before being submitted to full Council. The Corporate Director: Business Transformation and Efficiency agreed to get clarification on this matter.

RESOLVED that the Council's forward work programme be approved.

Title: 2012/13 Budget

1 What is the report about?

The report details the proposed budget for 2012/13.

2 What is the reason for making this report?

The Council is legally required to set a balanced and deliverable budget before the start of each financial year and to set the resulting level of Council Tax to allow bills to be sent to residents.

3 What are the Recommendations?

- 3.1 That members approve the budget proposals for 2012/13 as shown in the appendix
- 3.2 That members agree the resulting 2.8% increase in the level of Council Tax for 2012/13

4 Report details

- 4.1 The Welsh Government released its final settlement in early December. This showed the settlement that each Council would get. The settlement had changed marginally from the draft issued in October.
- 4.2 The final settlement showed that the increase in our revenue grant funding would be 0.7%
- 4.3 The final settlement showed that the cut in our capital settlement was also the same as had been shown in the draft. The funding has been cut by 6.9% (equivalent to around £400k) which is worse than the 5% cut we had originally planned for. This is a significant loss on top of the 20% cut we had to the current year's settlement meaning a loss of around £2m over the two years from £7.8m to £5.7m. The general capital funding is what we rely on to carry out Health and Safety works, major maintenance etc basically the work that allows us to keep our buildings going. Initial indications are that this will be cut by a further £700k (12%) in 2013/14

Medium Term Financial Plan

- 4.4 The outlook for public finance is still very poor for the medium term. It is likely that low settlements and a difficult financial situation will continue beyond the term of the current three year plan. This means it is very important for Members to consider a medium to long term view on all proposals for savings and not try for easy options that provide short term solutions.
- 4.5 The MTFP has identified savings for each of the next three years. However each year contains proposals that have not yet been worked up or may be aspirational. This brings with it a risk that they may not be delivered. The table below shows a summary of savings requirements for the next three years:

- 4.6 Following discussions with members and services, those savings considered to be at risk for 2012/13 were replaced with alternative savings which are considered to be deliverable.
- 4.7 The MTFP had originally assumed there would be cost increases in a number of areas. It is always difficult to accurately forecast inflationary changes in so many areas of expenditure and the Council always has to be prudent with its assumptions.

Fuel and energy cost increases

4.8 Cost increases in energy are likely to be lower than originally anticipated and have reduced the amount of savings required.

Pay and Single Status

- 4.9 The budget assumes a modest increase in staff pay. However, it will be several months before we are any clearer on proposals for pay due to the fact that these are negotiated at a UK level.
- 4.10 The agreement on single status brought 2 financial burdens to the Council's budget. The first was a one-off increase in pay costs as a number of staff were moved onto higher grades, the second was the 'incremental drift' of these grades. That means staff would have been appointed at the bottom of the grade and over time will move up to the top of the grade. We set up a budget to pay for this 'drift' and it is due to be fully allocated to services by 2014/15.

Schools protection

4.11 The Welsh Government expects that schools will be protected from savings. The Council must passport to schools an amount equivalent to 1% above the settlement. Denbighshire has budgeted for an increase above this level which means that schools will receive a budget increase of £1.25m and is the equivalent of an increase of about £90 per pupil.

Social Services Fees

4.12 There are further service specific pressures that will have to be addressed. The most notable of these is residential homes fees. Following the Pembrokeshire judgement all councils have reviewed their fee structures and are increasing the amounts they pay. The budget includes an increase to the fees budget to reflect the work undertaken so far by Social Services.

Priority Investment

4.13 Members were asked to consider which areas any additional priority funds such be aimed at. The original suggested allocations were broadly supported along with additional investment in demographic change / extra care housing as shown below:

- 4.14 As part of the 2011/12 budget setting process, the Council set aside a contingency of around £340k in case savings were not delivered or slipped into future years. It is now highly unlikely that most of this contingency will be required as almost all services are reporting balanced budgets or underspends.
- 4.15 Cabinet has recommended that this cash be added to the funds available as shown in the table above. This is one-off funding that will not be available in future years.
- 4.16 Any proposals to spend priority funds would need to be backed by a full business case and should members choose, they can change the level of funding to individual proposals as long as the total does not exceed £1m ongoing expenditure and £300k one off expenditure.

Council Tax

- 4.17 Appendix 1 details the overall budget position for the Council and shows the rise in Council Tax would be 2.8%
- 4.18 Denbighshire has set the lowest Council Tax increase in north Wales for six of the last seven years while still delivering services to its residents. Informal review suggests that we probably be the second lowest Council Tax rise in north Wales for 2012/13. Nationally it appears that most Councils are setting Council Tax rises between 2 and 3%, although a handful have gone below 2% and two Councils intend to set a 0% rise.

5 How does the decision contribute to the Corporate Priorities?

Effective management of the council's revenue and capital budgets and delivery of the agreed budget strategy underpins activity in all areas, including corporate priorities.

6 What will it cost and how will it affect other services?

Appendix 1 shows the full Council budget and the implications of the proposals within this report.

7 What consultations have been carried out?

Service challenges were held with each head of service and each challenge included representatives from scrutiny committee and Cabinet. Budget workshops were held with members in September, December and January. Performance Scrutiny also reviewed the budget setting process.

8 Chief Finance Officer Statement

2012/13 will be another challenging year for the Council's finances. It is likely that relatively low settlements will continue for the medium term and the Council must be mindful of this when setting this budget.

The budget as proposed is realistic and deliverable. It makes sufficient savings to balance our position, protects front line services from major reductions and allows investment of £1m into Council priorities.

This is delivered with a 2.8% increase in Council Tax which compares to general inflation running at around 4.5%.

9 What risks are there and is there anything we can do to reduce them?

If the budget is not agreed within the relevant timescale then the Council will be breaking the law.

This is the most challenging financial period the council has faced and failure to deliver the agreed budget strategy will put further pressure on services in the current and future financial years. Effective budget monitoring and control and early reporting of variances will help ensure that the financial strategy is achieved.

2. What is the reason for making this report?

Section 12 of the Criminal Justice and Police Act 2001 provides discretionary powers to Local Authorities, to make orders to prevent public nuisance and disorder linked to the consumption of alcohol in a Designated Public Place.









Map: Rhyl Area of Analysis





Map: Rhuddlan Area of Analysis





Map: St Asaph Area of Analysis





Map: Ruthin Area of Analysis




