Title: Welsh Language Supplementary Planning Guidance – Adoption of final document

1. What is the report about?

- 1.1. This report summarises responses from the recent consultation on the draft SPG Planning and the Welsh Language and recommends adoption without modifications enabling the guidance to be used in the determination of planning applications.

2. What is the reason for making this report?

- 2.1. Following the adoption of the Denbighshire Local Development Plan (LDP), an SPG on Welsh language considerations of development proposals is required in order to provide further guidance for developers, Officers and Members. A final copy of the SPG is attached to this report. Appendix A

3. What are the recommendations?

- 3.1. That Members adopt the final SPG on Welsh language for use in the determination of planning applications.

4. Report details

- 4.1. The Council took the decision to adopt the Local Development Plan on 4th June 2013. The theme Respecting Distinctiveness includes development plan policy RD5, which aims to protect the needs and interest of the Welsh language and the social and cultural fabric of communities. This is the first time Denbighshire has implemented a policy of this type. However, there are other local planning authorities in North Wales who implement a similar policy (namely Gwynedd/Mon, Snowdonia, Conwy).
- 4.2. The policy requires applicants to submit either a Community Linguistic Statement or Assessment to accompany their planning proposal depending on the nature of the application. The policy outlines that the normal requirement is for a statement is to be submitted for small proposals within villages, hamlets or the open countryside; whilst an assessment should accompany applications

within all settlements where the proposal is for large scale developments. No statement would be required for a small development within a settlement (lower growth town or Strategic Site) however an assessment would be required if the development was large scale (for example, the proposal to redevelop Indesit, Bodelwyddan required an Assessment).

- 4.3. The SPG has been produced in conjunction with the Corporate Director: Communities in light of the work undertaken on the Welsh Language Audit for the County. It is important that we have clear, robust guidance in place for applicants and officers.
- 4.4. The SPG was subject to public consultation for 10 weeks between 2nd December and 10th February 2014. A consultation report detailing the results of the consultation and responses received is attached as Appendix B to this report. No major issues were raised and therefore no changes are proposed.

5. How does the decision contribute to the Corporate Priorities?

- 5.1. *Corporate Priorities 2012-17.* Whilst Welsh language does not feature specifically within the 7 corporate priorities identified in the current Corporate Plan, the SPG will indirectly contribute positively too many cross cutting aspects of Council business.
- 5.2. *The BIG Plan 2011-2014.* The SPG will directly contribute positively to aspects of the BIG Plan particularly:
 - Older people can live independent and fulfilled lives;
 - Children and young people having skills for life; and
 - Needs of rural communities are recognised and met;

6. What will it cost and how will it affect other services?

- 6.1. Agreeing the SPG for adoption is not anticipated to create any additional cost.

7. What are the main conclusions of the Equality Impact Assessment (EqIA) undertaken on the decision? The completed EqIA template should be attached as an appendix to the report.

- 7.1 An EqIA is not considered necessary for this decision. The principle of requiring assessment of impact of development on Welsh language has been established through adoption of the LDP. The SPG provides further guidance on this. The LDP underwent a full EqIA in May 2011.

8. What consultations have been carried out with Scrutiny and others?

- 8.1 Internal consultation has been carried out with officers in Development Control Section and Corporate Director for Communities and the Council Bilingual Forum.
- 8.2 Input on the content of the SPG has also been provided through two workshop sessions held with the LDP Members Steering Group and City, Town &

Community Councils. The draft document was also consulted with a range of stakeholders and the general public as detailed in the consultation report at appendix B.

9. Chief Finance Officer Statement

9.1 Any costs associated with the guidance should be contained within existing budgets and therefore there are no obvious financial implications contained in the report.

10. What risks are there and is there anything we can do to reduce them?

10.1 In the absence of up-to-date guidance there is a risk the Council will be unable to effectively operate the LDP policy. This would result in a failure to secure the full consideration of impacts of new development on the use of Welsh language within the social and cultural fabric of our communities to the detriment. The adoption of a new Welsh language SPG has been identified as a priority by the LDP Members Steering Group.
