At this stage, a draft Traffic and Parking Review has been completed and is being presented to Scrutiny Committee.

A residents' survey was sent to 20,000 households in Denbighshire and surrounding areas to request residents' views on a number of factors relating to shopping, especially shopping in Denbighshire town centres.

Changes to parking restrictions will often directly impact upon members of the public who have a physical disability that impairs their mobility. However, the actions proposed by the Review are generally positive in terms of aiming to improve accessibility such as by increasing enforcement of parking bays to ensure a greater availability of parking spaces.
