Implications of the score

The changes to the existing Cold calling Control Zones will make it easier for residents to access information and preventative door stickers. The scheme will be less onerous and more inclusive. Use of websites and social media will reduce communication costs and make it easier for residents and businesses to access the information. Removal of signage costs (purchase and erection) will make the measures more sustainable.

Main conclusions

The revised Cold Calling control initiative will offer increased accessibility to cold calling protection. It will allow all householders to access electronic information and obtain door/window stickers to discourage unwanted cold callers. The move away from street signage will have a positive environmental impact and reduce the resources required to purchase and erect the signs. The reinvigorated scheme will help to protect all residents, particularly those who are likely to be vulnerable to predatory doorstep criminals and encourage all residents to support legitimate local traders.

The reduced use of unscrupulous transitory traders will reduce the prevalence of unfinished or poor standard housing repairs and fly tipping of unwanted materials.

There may be a reduction in the prevalence of modern slavery associated with the use of rogue traders.

Overall Impact	Positive
Justification for impact	The project will protect businesses which trade fairly. Most traders following aggressive and unfair practice are not locally based and are transient. The reinvigorated Cold Calling Control measures will increase the awareness that residents have about good and bad doorstep trading and reduce the likelihood that they will pay too much or receive substandard services.
Further actions required	Review of the number of stickers provided and of the number and type of complaints received in relation to cold calling in Denbighshire.

Justification for impact	The new approach will use fewer physical materials which will lead to a reduction in the need to recycle and waste.
Further actions required	Monitoring of the scheme and periodic review will identify and minimise any negative outcomes and help to manage the positives.

Justification for impact	Reductio in anxiety and improved physical protection for vulnerable residents based on improved knowledge and provision of deterrent stickers.
Further actions required	Monitoring and review will allow us to identify positive and negative impacts of the initiative and to react accordingly.

A more equal Denbighshire Overall Impact Positive The cold calling reduction measures are universally available and designed to protect residents who may be vulnerable to unscrupulous traders or criminals who cold call. The use of social media should make it easier for people in all areas to access the key messages. Monitoring and review. It is likely that we will consider special measures such as use of contact centres and partner organisations to ensure that residents of disadvantaged areas are able to access the materials and receive the key messages (and protections).

Justification for impact	The revised scheme is more accessible and protects individuals and legitimate businesses. The improved awareness of rogue trading allows individuals to exercise further control in relation to how they purchase goods and services.
Further actions required	We will review the scheme on a regular basis and respond to feedback. This activity will allow us to make adjustments when they are deemed appropriate.

Positive impacts identified:

Safe communities and individuals	This proposal is specifically designed to protect vulnerable and older people by reducing opportunities for criminals and unscrupulous traders to cold call. The altered scheme is more accessible and allows any household to access door stickers and the accompanying advice rather than having to be part of a co ordinated area.
Community participation and resilience	The changes to the scheme make it easier for individuals or groups within communities to access the materials. We hope to enhance awareness of rogue trading and therefore improve resilience for individuals and wider communities.
The attractiveness of the area	Rogue traders often carry out building and gardening services to a very poor standard and leave schemes unfinished. Encouraging the use of reputable businesses reduces the likelihood of unsightly building work and abandoned materials. Reduced number of street signs. The revised scheme places emphasis on stickers in individual properties and electronic information.
Connected communities	The revised scheme uses the electronic infrastructure and can be adopted by virtual communities throughout the county area. Legitimate businesses will be protected by the deterrent to rogue traders who achieve unfair trading advantages.

Justification for impact	Support for local business. Reduced opportunity for rogue trading and modern slavery. Improved protection and self reliance for vulnerable residents. Reduced reliance on other support services.
Further actions required	Monitoring and review.

Local, national, international supply chains	The scheme encourages the use of reputable local businesses. Rogue traders are not concerned about where products come from or how they are sourced. A reduction in the use of unscrupulous traders will benefit legitimate supply chains.
Human rights	Some rogue traders are known to have strong links to human trafficking and modern slavery. The scheme is designed to reduce the prevalence of rogue trading and protect residents and to reduce the activities of unscrupulous traders.
