Title:	Report on the AONB Management Plan

1. What is the report about?

The Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000 places a statutory duty on Local Authorities which contain an AONB to adopt a Management Plan for the designated area. The Joint Committee approved the Draft Plan for Public Consultation in October 2021.

2. What is the reason for making this report?

Decision Required – to adopt the Draft Management Plan for the Clwydian Range and Dee Valley AONB

3. What are the Recommendations?

Recommendation – That the Joint committee adopts the Draft Management Plan for the Clwydian Range and Dee Valley AONB

4. Report details.

This draft Management Plan is produced in accordance with the duties placed on the Local Authorities by Section 89 of the Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000. It sets out an agenda for conserving and enhancing the Special Features and Qualities for the AONB.

The Plan identifies the key special features and qualities that together make the special character of the landscape of the Clwydian Range and Dee Valley nationally important. It recognises a number of key challenges facing the landscape in the coming years and sets out an agenda to conserve and enhance them in the context of these challenges.

As such the Plan is themed across four areas:

- **Nature, Landscape and Heritage:** *Addressing decline in species and the Responding to the ecological emergency and seeking to address a decline in*

key species. Sustainable management of key habitats that make up many of the Special Features of the AONB.

- **Adapting to a Changing Climate:** The resilience of the AONB's special qualities and features to climate change. Ensuring that our response to climate change takes into consideration the need to conserve landscape quality.
- **Recreation, Health and Wellbeing:** The value of the AONB in supporting physical and mental wellbeing. Pressures of recreation and tourism on sensitive landscapes. The impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on visitor behaviour and associated pressures on the AONB.
- **The Rural Economy:** Opportunities and challenges facing the rural economy within the AONB in light of the Covid-19 pandemic, agricultural reform following exit from the EU.

The Draft Plan went out for Public consultation from 1st February 2022 – 18th March 2022. A number of responses were received as laid out in appendix 1

5. How does it contribute to the Clwydian Range & Dee Valley AONB Management Plans Priorities?

This draft Management Plan 2020 – 2025, if adopted, will set the priorities for the AONB for the next five years

6. What will it cost and how will it affect other services?

The material costs of publishing the plan will be approximately £5k funding for which has been secured through NRW.

The plan will provide a solid platform for which to base future funding applications to both NRW and Welsh Government as well as other potential funding bodies.

7. What are the main conclusions of the Well-being Impact Assessment?

The project is focused on conserving and enhancing the quality of the special landscape of the Clwydian Range and Dee Valley and the multiple benefits it provides in terms of public health, biodiversity, sustainability and the tourism

economy. The Clwydian Range and Dee Valley AONB is an IUCN Category V Landscape which means that it is recognised globally as a significant landscape.

10. What risks are there and is there anything we can do to reduce them?

There is a Statutory duty placed on the Managing Authorities of any AONB to produce a Management Plan for the designated area under regulations contained within Section 89 of the Countryside and Rights of Way Act. Failure to adopt a plan will mean that the Joint Committee will not be fulfilling this duty.

Future funding for the AONB from Natural Resources Wales and Welsh Government will need to be linked to an agreed and adopted AONB Plan

11. Power to make the Decision

The Legal basis lies in Section 101 (5) of the Local Government Act of 1972 and the Local Government Act 2000, where Local Authorities can enter arrangements to 'discharge functions jointly with one or more Local Authorities by means of a Joint Committee.'
